Prize Distribution.

THE Annual Distribution of Prizes and Certificates was held on July 20th, in the evening, the Lord Mayor, the Right Hon. W. B. Bowring, being the distributor. The Lecture Hall was crowded to the doors with boys, parents, and friends. There were present on the platform, in addition to the Head Master, Messrs. T. F. Abraham (President), Harold Whalley (Secretary), the Rev. John Sephton, Rev. J. J. Flett; Messrs. A. Holt, C. S. Samuel, R. W. Ker, T. C. Ryley, S. B. Leicester, T. Gee, W. H. Picton, Thos. Crosfield, Worthington, J. de G. Gaudin, A. W. Blundell, J. Bulmer, W. C. Cox, and E. J. W. Harvey. After the singing of "The British Grenadiers" by the boys,

The President, Mr. T. F. Abraham, opened the proceedings with a short speech. He commented on the change in the hour of beginning morning school from 9 to 9.30 a.m., which he said had become necessary owing to the extension of the boundaries and for other reasons. The time of the summer holidays, he said, was awkward. Breaking up as they did so late in the year, it was often hardly worth while for parents to send their children to the seaside, since the weather was usually so cold. In his opinion these holidays should begin in June, when the days were longer and warmer. Regarding the preparation of Home Lessons he also had a proposition to make. These Home Lessons were done at home, and, therefore, were more or less unsatisfactory owing to the numerous temptations to interrupt work for intervals of play. He proposed that this preparation should take place in school under the supervision of masters, after school hours, and at a nominal charge. At the conclusion of his speech he introduced the Lord Mayor.

The Lord Mayor, on rising, declared it was a great pleasure to him to come there that evening to deliver the prizes to those who had been successful, industrious, and applicatory enough to secure them. He was pleased to know that the school was maintaining its character and principles. (Applause.) He was told that the Liverpool Institute dated back to the year 1825. The foundation-stone was laid by Lord Brougham. (Cheers.) The Institute was,

therefore, the oldest unendowed middle-class school in the city. (Applause.) From the day of its foundation till that day it had bestowed a very excellent and admirable education on the children of Liverpool citizens. (Applause.) Indeed he believed he was correct in saying that four recent Mayors, and the first Lord Mayor of Liverpool, had received part at least of their education at the Liverpool Institute. (Cheers.) The Masters in the past had done their duty nobly, and he was sure he could say that in the presence of his old friend the late Head Master, Rev. John Sephton. (Loud and continued cheers.) He was pleased to see that the boys had a cheer in their heart for Mr. Sephton. (Applause.) To the boys he said no doubt they had received much excellent advice, but he hoped they would take advantage of the principles they had inculcated into them—principles which in the future were to be their capital in life, and so enable them to become excellent and noble citizens of Liverpool and of this great country. (Loud applause.)

At the termination of the Lord Mayor's speech the whole school sang "The Mermaid."

The Head Master then gave his annual report. During the course of this year, he said, among other successes, two old boys in particular had distinguished themselves very highly at Cambridge, L. D. Barnett and J. B. Dale. The former had obtained the Craven Scholarship and a First Class in the Classical Tripos in his second year of residence; while the latter had been placed in the First Class of the Mathematical Tripos, Part II. With regard to the work of the school, he could say that the Upper Fifth Form, High School, was the best ever known in the school. Besides the exploits of Affleck and Whipp, the work from top to bottom had been so good that he would have been glad to give a prize to each boy in it. The general work of the school had been also very excellent.

The School song, "Three Times Three," was next sung, Mr. Knowles very ably rendering the solo. Then came the event of the evening, the presentation of prizes by the Lord Mayor.

After the distribution of prizes followed the School song, "Here's a health unto his Majesty," with solo finely rendered by Mr. Book. A scene from Molière's "L'Avare," in which C. M. Long and F. B. Cox were to take the parts respectively of *Harpagon* and *La Flèche*, was omitted from the proceedings owing to the previous illness of C. M. Long. The song "Bay of Biscay" therefore followed, sung by the whole school. After which, J. J. Bell as *Brutus*, and W. H. Wallace as *Cassius*, represented very creditably the quarrel scene in "Julius Cæsar."

Mr. T. C. Ryley now rose to propose a vote of thanks to the Lord Mayor, and was seconded by Mr. C. S. Samuel. The vote was carried with loud applause. After the Mayor had briefly replied, the proceedings closed with the singing of the "National Anthem," and cheers for "the Mayor," "the Masters," "the old School," etc., etc.

Literary and Debating Society.

A preliminary meeting of the L. I. L. D. S. was held on September 13th. Mr. C. M. Jones presided over an attendance of fourteen. After the reading of the minutes, Messrs. J. L. Hawkes and P. J. Rose were elected to the vacant posts of treasurer and secretary, respectively. Mr. P. J. A. Francis, in a short speech resigned his post as editor of the Magazine. A vote of thanks, thanking Mr. Francis for his services and congratulating him on his recent success, was accorded to him. The discussion of rules followed, several amendments to the old rules being adopted. It was decided by a majority of 8 to 3 that no new editor should be appointed in the room of Mr. Francis. This terminating the business, the meeting adjourned.

A meeting was held on September 20th. Mr. C. M. Jones presided over an attendance of twelve. After the discussion of private business, Mr. N. C. Miller took the chair, and called upon Mr. C. M. Jones to open in the affirmative the debate:—"Is the payment of members of Parliament by the State needless and impracticable?" Mr. Jones argued that a good education, which in the present state of civilisation poorer men did not receive was necessary to make a man a good legislator. He pointed out that such members as labour members at present in the House (for whom the proposal was principally intended), devoted themselves entirely to labour matters, neglecting everything else. He argued that nearly all the present members, by reason of private wealth did not require State support. These were men fitted by education and ability to legislate for all classes, and experience had shown that the majority of able statesmen sprang from this class. He cited the cases of France, United States, and Austria, in all of which countries State payment had proved a failure. The chairman then called upon Mr. P. J. A. Francis to reply for the negative. Mr. Francis showed that although in France, Austria and the United States the payment might have proved a failure, yet in

Switzerland it had been adopted with successful results. He argued that State payment was necessary to support poor members who, when elected, were a burden to their constituents or friends. He shewed that the proposal was practicable by pointing out that a working man of frugal and thrifty habits would require no great sum to support him; the cost to the State would therefore be comparatively trivial. In the discussion which followed, Messrs. R. E. Kelly and E. Tebbutt spoke for the affirmative, and Mr. P. J. Rose for the negative. The chairman having spoken, and the leaders having replied, a vote was taken with the result:—Affirmative 7; Negative 3. Majority for affirmative 4. The meeting then adjourned.

A meeting was held on September 27th. Mr. C. M. Jones presided over an attendance of fourteen. After the reading of the minutes, Messrs. J. G. Williams and J. B. Affleck were elected members of the Society. On the motion of Mr. Miller it was decided unanimously that three sub-editors to the Magazine should be appointed. Messrs. W. H. Gem and R. E. Kelly were appointed whips for the Sixth Form. Mr. P. J. Rose then proceeded to open in the affirmative the debate:—"Is theatre-going advisable?" Mr. Rose contended that the stage was built on the firm foundation of the church; for it was the early church which introduced the play into England. As these miracle plays and allegories died out after doing their part in the education of the people gradually, the drama was evolved, and the stage ennobled by the works of the best poets, who deemed it an honour to have their compositions represented. Since the time of Shakespeare, the other arts of music and painting have been developed largely by the influence of the stage. Thus all along the theatre has been a power for good in educating and elevating the people who visited it. Mr. N. C. Miller replied for the negative. He called the attention of the meeting to the fact that actors, as a class, are generally admitted to be of bad character; nor was this surprising when we reflected on the character of many plays at present in vogue. Not only are actors and actresses, in his opinion, of low character, but theatre-goers, as a class, are also persons of little moral worth. This is probably the combined result of degrading plays, degraded actors and degraded drinking-bars. Lastly, he contended that whether the men who frequented theatres became degraded or not, it was advisable that all should abstain from theatre-going if only to prevent the perpetuation of an immoral class. In conclusion he denied that the productions of the best poets are acted at the present day. In the discussion which followed, Messrs. R. E. Kelly and J. B. Tayler spoke for the negative: Mr. C. M. Long for the affirmative, and Mr. P. J. A. Francis was neutral. The chairman in his speech pointed out that, whatever might be the moral character of the actors, this question rested only between the hearer and the play. The leaders having replied, a vote was taken:—Affirmative 8; Negative 6. Majority for affirmative 2. The meeting then adjourned.

Chat on the Corridor.

"WHEN is the Magazine coming out?" This question has been repeated so often that the Editors are tired of listening to it, and still more tired of answering it. Elsewhere will be found a short report of the Cricket season. Although only two Shield matches were won, the club did fairly well in comparison with the records of previous years. The chief fault in the club is at once seen by a glance at the batting and bowling averages. There were only two batsmen, and these two shared the bowling. The rest of the team apparently did nothing else but attend the matches to watch these two play. Their play was splendid and certainly well worth watching, but two cannot always win a match. When they were in form they invariably won the match, but when both were out of form there was no one to fall back upon. If our cricketers remember this next year we feel confident that they will have considerably more success than has attended any Institute team in the past. In the meantime, the Football Club is the centre of attraction to the devotees of sport. It is rather early to say much about this club, but we hope that it will have a successful season. Candidly we do not think that the club has any chance of eclipsing the splendid results of last season's team, nor do we expect it will have the same prospects of winning the shield, but it is our sincere hope that in this matter we may prove false prophets.

The L. I. L. D. S. promises to do good work this session. The meetings have been well attended and the members take a great interest in both public and private business. The meeting held on October 4th was graced by the presence of Mr. L. D. Barnett of Trinity College, Cambridge. Mr. Barnett read a most learned and masterly paper entitled "The Enigma of a Past Generation." The paper was one of the finest we have heard in the society and was worthy of Mr. Barnett's undoubtedly high attainments. There was a good attendance and the members listened with great attention to his description of Simonides, a Classical and Oriental Scholar who

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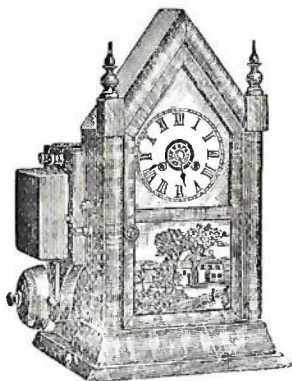
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exercised his talents in forging ancient manuscripts. We are glad to say that an epitome of the paper kindly furnished by Mr. Barnett will appear in our next issue.
